<p><b>Knowledge</b></p> <p>Victorian toys were usually made from wood, metal and paper. Children from rich Victorian families played with rocking horses and dolls that were made out of expensive materials. Children from poor Victorian families played with toys that were usually homemade. Victorian children and children who lived during the First and Second World Wars enjoyed playing outside. There are many similarities and differences between old and new toys – this can be down to how they move and what they are made from. Some toys, like teddies, have hardly changed over time.</p> <div style="display: flex; justify-content: space-between;"> <div style="width: 45%;"> <p><b>Old Toys</b></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Often wooden</li> <li>• Usually mechanical or moved by hand</li> <li>• Usually handmade</li> </ul> </div> <div style="width: 45%;"> <p><b>New Toys</b></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Often plastic</li> <li>• Usually need batteries</li> <li>• Usually made by machine</li> </ul> </div> </div>		<p><b>Vocabulary</b></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• <b>Approximately</b> – about; almost, exactly</li> <li>• <b>Chronology</b> – the order of events in time</li> <li>• <b>Differences</b> – the condition of being different from or not like</li> <li>• <b>Era</b> – a period of time in History that normally begins with a significant event.</li> <li>• <b>Handmade</b> – made by hand or with tools, rather than by a machine</li> <li>• <b>Plastic</b> – a material that is light in weight and does not break easily</li> <li>• <b>Similarity</b> – likeness / something that is the same as or nearly the same as something else</li> <li>• <b>Victorian</b> – during the reign of Queen Victoria (link to prepare for learning in Y2)</li> <li>• <b>Wood</b> – the material which forms the trunks and branches of trees</li> </ul>
